## 2015/16 Annual Report

### 1. President's Report

It gives me great pleasure to present this report outlining some of the important activities undertaken by the Network during the past year.

The Network continues to be well supported by environmental groups and develop partnerships with other land managers on the Bellarine. These lead to important programs and initiatives that provide greater environmental education and involvement.

The BCN sponsored the Glass Master Class Threatened Species with DCSCA, Presented to the Corangamite CMA Board, administered the Green Army Program, continued to develop new groups including the Clifton Springs Curlewis Coastcare Group and Friends of Yellow Gums.

A significant outcome was the launch of the BCN Website and Mapping Portal. A project in partnership with Corangamite CMA and Federation University, this project has been able to capture the history, achievements and current programs of the Network. It also promotes all of the groups and organisations with the BCN and current activities.

Our schools Program continues to grow with 5 Secondary Colleges, 10 Primary Schools and 2 tertiary institutions involved in our programs. Significantly this year saw the 10<sup>th</sup> consecutive year and anniversary with Bellarine Secondary College Year 8 Environment Day. A total of 2000 students have gone through this program.

Partnerships with local communities, authorities, Coastal Committees of Management, Local and State Government continue to provide important projects and funding for BCN initiatives. Overall this leads to a more engaged local community in environmental values and threats, more on ground works and outcomes.

In conclusion I would like to thank the entire Network, Staff and all delegates for their ongoing contribution and commitment to their particular group, organisations and to the BCN.

## **2. Delivered Programs and Activities**

The BCN is active in every year achieving numerous outcomes and projects on the Bellarine with various community groups, partners and agencies. This previous year activities have continued and grown. This year the BCN Committee and Staff attended and presented at the; National Botanical Gardens Conference, Corangamite CMA Board Presentation, Master Class, Glass Making Festival (DCSCA), Awards Australia Finalist – Regional Awards Category, Borough of Queenscliffe – Australia Day Awards – Winner Environment Category.

Below is a summary of the projects and partnerships for the year.

### **Barwon Water – Shell Rd Coastal Moonah Woodland Protection and Enhancement**

- A 3 year partnership with Barwon Water, and working with local community groups in particular SBEA to restore and revegetate a remnant CMW site that suffered dieback. This program has continued the BCN role in protection and enhancement of CMW sites on the Bellarine. With site visits including local community groups and Barwon Water this has been a great project and new partnership with Barwon Water.

### **Bellarine Bayside Community Grant Project**

- This project has allowed tools and equipment improvements for the Community On Ground Works Trailer and fostering a new partnership for Coastcare activities with St Leonards and Portarlington PS and with Bellarine Bayside COM.

### **Bellarine Indian Myna Program – BIMP**

- The BIMP has once again been reinvigorated. The project has had numerous of meetings and refining of the program and now is being run in the Spring of 2016. This program will see it being run in all towns of the Bellarine, which is a significant increase in the program and resources from the initial pilot. This program continues to receive great support with 5 local people volunteering as town coordinators for the program.

### **Caring For Our Bays Litter Hotspot Grant**

- The Caring For Our Bays Program continues to grow from strength to strength. With all key land managers and community groups involved over 10 Litter Hot Spots have been monitored and engagement and education programs built around these.
- Significantly, this year saw the culmination of 2 years work in developing the ‘Be a Local Hero’ initiative which utilises local species to tell the story from ‘their’ perspective.
- We are delighted that this initiative is being used by so many of the BCN Groups and organisation to lift the profile of the Caring For Our Bays program and to protect, beautify and enhance the Bellarine.

- The Final year will see the 'Be a Local Hero' program be rolled out to 20 Primary and Secondary school, bins and Drain Pit lids across the Bellarine and Geelong areas
- This new and exciting initiative has seen more investment for BCN and a new officer appointed. The project has identified litter hotspots on the Bellarine.

#### **Bonnyvale Wetlands and Star of the Sea**

- This year saw the 8 year of running this program. A successful day with 60 Grade 4 and 5 students conducting revegetation activity, flora and fauna walk and WaterWatch activities.

#### **Queenscliffe Narrows Project & Coastal Moonah Woodland Restoration**

- A partnership with the Borough of Queenscliffe, this program looks to engage the community in the protection and enhancement of CMW. Activities include 4 different schools, 2 tertiary institutions, 2 community days and 100's of volunteers.
- This year has seen an increase in the amount of schools involved and community activities along with erosion monitoring continuing at Dog Beach.

#### **Bellarine Rail Trail Fellows Rd Revegetation Day**

- This annual revegetation day is into its 7<sup>th</sup> year. Working with the SBEA, Queenscliffe PS, BoQ and GJGarner Homes allows this program to continue.
- Approx 300 plants are used in this revegetation day which is always a great result for the local nursery and community and continues to be supported

#### **Bellarine Secondary College Year 8 Environment Day**

- In 2016 saw the 11th consecutive year of this partnership and activity. Jointly led by BCN, Barwon Coast COM and Bellarine Secondary College sees 200 students and 10 educators provide various environmental education for the students.
- This day continues to receive wonderful support from other industry groups and organisations

#### **Clifton Springs Coastcare Group and Booklet Development**

- Continuing on from previous Environment days with local Primary school Drysdale and Clifton Springs, the Booklet will be released in 2015. A collaboration with DCSCA and CoGG this project has increased awareness and understanding of the area, the values and threats.

#### **Coastcare Grant - Summer by the Sea and Surf Life Saving Club Nippers Program Nippers**

- This year saw projects with Bellarine Bayside, Point Lonsdale and Ocean Grove Surf Life Saving Clubs. Approximately 80 Nippers kids took part in environmental education and another 100 campers / holiday makers participated in activities in Portarlington, St Leonards and Indented Head.

#### **Landholder Info, BLG Support Role and Staff Supervision**

- Support and supervise of 2 BLG Landcare Staff. Attend BLG General and Committee Meetings. Advise landholders on LC matters and facilitate the Bellarine Gorse program with outstanding sites and landholders.

### **Moolap Saltworks Site and Representation**

- Work in collaboration with Birdlife Australia, Geelong Field Naturalists Club and Geelong Environment Council to lobby Government for protection of the site. Attend meeting and joint letter signatories with above groups to relevant authorities.

### **Ocean Grove Environment Booklet Development**

- Develop a draft proposal with OGCC and FOOGNR for protection of Ocean Grove significant trees after recent clearing of old growth trees.
- Further develop this into a whole Environment Booklet for OG. Have secured funding and put together a steering / working group

### **Ocean Grove PS – Coastcare Environment Day**

- Co run and organise with Barwon Coast and Ocean Grove Primary School Grade 4 Coastcare Day. Run 3 activities for 70 students including Coastcare Challenge Course, tree planting and fauna interaction
- This activity has been going for 7 years, however this year was cancelled due to weather.

### **Point Lonsdale PS Caring For Our Bays Environment Day**

- Put on hold until first half of 2017 due to planning and logistics with the school.

### **St Ignatius and the Basin Enviro Day**

- Run two field trips in The Basin for Yr 10 Environment Students. Look at biodiversity Values and the impact of Bridal Creeper.
- Release Rust Fungus for the Bridal Creeper in the Basin, approx 60 students engaged.

### **Clifton Springs PS – Clifton Springs Boat Ramp**

- A change of location to the Boat Ramp. Working in collaboration with CoGG and DCSCA to drive this program
- 90 kids in attendance running 3 different activities throughout the day

### **St Leonards PS Caring For Our Bays Environment Day**

- Run in conjunction with Bellarine Bayside. Approx 100 students who participated in the day
- A re-vamp of our previous projects with St Leonards PS and a great partnership with Bellarine Bayside.

### **Portarlington PS Caring For Our Bays Environment Day**

- Run in conjunction with Bellarine Bayside. Approx 100 students who participated in the day
- A re-vamp of our previous projects with Portarlington PS and a great partnership with Bellarine Bayside.

### 3. Case Studies – Barwon Water Shell Rd Coastal Moonah Woodland Program

Bellarine Catchment Network (BCN) has managed the Coastal Moonah Woodland Restoration Site adjacent to Shell Rd for the previous 3 years. We have undertaken two community site visits and seen the improvement to the site. Initially Moonah mortality saw an increase in grassy and woody weed cover. A program of seasonal weed control has led to a decrease in overall weed percentage cover and increase in recruitment of Moonah and other CMW vegetation

Photopoint monitoring has occurred at different locations inside the site area. This has helped to determine change over time and recruitment of plant species, both introduced and indigenous. The photopoint monitoring sites includes canopy cover, and aspects from the north view on the east, centre and west sides of the site. All photopoints are identified through GPS Coordinates and have been recorded over time with the same photopoints re-taken,

Other management issues have included hard rubbish with the plan to remove through the responsibility of Barwon Water. Critical habitat species including Coastal Saltmarsh plants continue to recruit at this site improving the overall habitat value of the site. Pest Animals control has been conducted with rabbit harbour and baiting.

This project has seen a new successful partnership with BCN and Barwon Water, involving the local community groups in the rehabilitation of this site.

### Be a local hero Put your rubbish in a bin

**Helpful Frogs**  
Frogs are an indicator species that helps show when pollution threatens a local ecosystem.

**Food Chain Plastic**  
Plastics are not biodegradable. They break down into smaller pieces that can be consumed by fish, which are eaten by humans.

Most rubbish reaches seas via waterways and

**80%**  
originates from urban sources.

**Growling Grass Frog**  
*Litoria raniformis*  
Growling Grass Frogs live amongst reeds, sedges and rushes growing beside slow flowing freshwater sources such as swamps and wetlands. Their distinctive call of several short bursts followed by a long deep growl can be heard during the warmer months. They feed mainly on ground dwelling insects, but are also known to eat birds, snakes and other frogs.

**Small Starts**  
Like all frogs, they start life as tadpoles. Growling Grass Frog tadpoles can grow to 10cm in length before turning into frogs.

Tadpoles play an important part in the food chain for many species including fish.

**Stealth Hunters**  
They are excellent swimmers and will lie in wait for their prey to come to them.

**Did you know?**  
The Growling Grass Frog is a threatened species under the *Littered and Tossed Cigarette Act 1998*.

### Be a local hero Put your rubbish in a bin

**Weedy Seadragon**  
*Phyllopteryx taeniolatus*  
Weedy Seadragons are one of the world's most unique animals. These delicate animals are on many scuba divers bucket list to see and photograph. They are always a pleasant surprise to see.

This incredible animal is actually a fish and uses its small transparent fin to swim. It can be found very close to the shoreline in Southern Port Phillip and is therefore particularly vulnerable to human impact.

**70% Dad!**  
Male Seadragons carry up to 1000 eggs on their tail for two months, until hatching occurs over a period of 45 days.

Weedy Seadragons can live up to 40 years in the wild.

**80%**  
of Marine Waste comes from land

**Plastic Problems**  
Weedy Seadragons in our local waters become entangled in plastic litter including fishing line and die.

**Did you know?**  
Cigarette butts are the single most littered item in the world.

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### Be a local hero Put your rubbish in a bin

**Australian Fur Seal**  
*Arctocephalus pusillus*  
Australia has such a rich abundance of the seals, but they are now almost extinct. A very social animal often seen playing with each other.

Ingestible by nature, rubbish is seen as any other food leading to life threatening injuries through strangulation or ingestion. They feed on a variety of fish, squid and octopus. Seals are a major predator of fur Phillip and Gullipig.

**Deep Divers**  
The Australian Fur Seal can dive to depths of 200m to catch fish and squid.

**Not a true seal**  
Fur seals are different to true seals that the Elephant seals because they have external ears and can use all four limbs to swim underwater.

**Wire worry**  
Discarded fishing line is one of the biggest threats to seals. They become entangled and die.

**Litter Magnets**  
Litter attracts more litter. When an area looks dirty and unclean, for people tend to litter more. In contrast, people are more reluctant to litter clean areas.

**Did you know?**  
80% of the litter on beaches comes from suburban streets through the stormwater system.

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### Be a local hero Put your rubbish in a bin

**Burruran Dolphin**  
*Tursiops australis*  
Burruran dolphin, a species of bottlenose dolphin, was classified as a new species in 2011. With an estimated population of 130 individuals in Victoria, around 10% of these live in Port Phillip and Geelong Bay.

**Native Name**  
"Burruran" is an Aboriginal name meaning "large sea fish of the porpoise kind"

**Species affected**  
There are 44 species of dolphins found in the world. They are all affected by litter.

**Dangerous Divers**  
Marine creatures mistake plastics and other garbage as food and ingest it. This causes blockages within their digestive system and a painful death.

In 2013 a dolphins diet and was found with 4.5kg of plastic in its stomach. Dolphins can eat fish that have eaten plastic. Plastic becomes part of the food chain.

Every year more than **6 million** tonnes of rubbish ends up in the world's oceans. **80%** of this is plastic.

The Bellarine Indian Myna Program (BIMP) started in 2014 to control expanding Indian Myna number on the Bellarine. A trial was commenced in Ocean Grove with 30 participants in the initial year. A review of the program and high interest in all Bellarine towns led to the Bellarine Catchment Network supporting roll out across all towns and areas of the Bellarine.

Subsequent funding applications has led to only minor support, however community momentum suggests that the community feels passionately about this issue.

This workshop will focus on: Township and Community Indian Myna Control Groups, Approved trapping and euthanizing methods, Procedures for loaning Traps, recording and monitoring populations and distribution and roll out of the Bellarine Indian Myna Control Program in 2016, with an aim for Autumn program in all towns.
